USGA RULE OF THE DAY

18-2a/3 Ball Lifted and Dropped Away from Boundary Stake Under Obstruction Rule

- *Q:* A player's swing is interfered with by a stake defining out of bounds. The player mistakenly considers the stake an obstruction and he lifts his ball and drops it in the manner prescribed in Rule 24-2b. What is the ruling?
- A: The player incurs a penalty of one stroke under Rule 18-2a and he must replace his ball before playing his next stroke. Otherwise, he loses the hole in match play or he incurs a total penalty of two strokes in stroke play -- see penalty statement under Rule 18.

HANDICAP CHATTER

USGA Handicap Manual, section 9-4 specifies how handicap strokes are allocated in match play. Whether in singles or four-ball (partner better ball), the course handicaps are first determined. Then the lowest handicap player plays at scratch and the other player(s) reduce their course handicaps by the same number of strokes. So, if John and Ted have course handicaps of 4 and 8, respectively, John plays at scratch and Ted plays at 4.

The strokes are allocated to the holes with the lowest handicap numbers. In the previous example, Ted would get strokes on holes rated 1-4. These are not necessarily the most difficult holes; instead they are the holes on which the bogey golfer needs a stroke to most often halve the hole against a scratch player.

How do the holes get their handicap numbers? The golf club attached to the course establishes them. When Balboa was reconfigured into a par 72 course, your Board of Directors performed the function of re-rating the holes, two of which were brand new. The USGA recommends that actual statistical data be gathered over a period of time to determine the order in which the holes require a stroke to equalize the bogey and scratch golfer. Because of the press of time, your Board didn't have the luxury of gathering this empirical data, so we assigned the numbers using our long experience with the course and our intuition.

As actual numbers are accumulated, changes to hole handicap assignments can be made. If officially changing the hole handicaps is impractical (because there are 20,000 printed scorecards in inventory for instance), players are free to make their own assignments in casual play. In tournament play, the *Committee in Charge of the Competition* may specify different hole handicap assignments, provided advance published notice is given the competitors (Handicap Manual section 9-3 a).

Your Board was in the process of reviewing the hole assignments for Encino when, due to a communication snafu, new scorecards were printed before we were able to complete the task. We certainly would have changed the hole rating on the par-5 fourth hole, which has become the bane of the low handicappers' existence.

In four-ball stroke play, the format we use in the Goeckner Classic qualifier, the USGA recommends that the spread between partners' course handicaps be limited to 8 or less strokes because a larger spread gives an unfair advantage to that team.

CITY CORNER

By now just about everyone has heard that Governor Schwarzenegger's proposed golf use tax was not part of the state budget adopted in late February. Those who haven't should check out the detailed story reprinted from the PLGA website elsewhere in this issue of the Eagle.

As someone who was intimately involved in the campaign against the tax, I know how difficult a fight this was and will continue to be. It's not over yet. Bad ideas have a way of coming back. I also know how much luck played a role in the successful outcome. Of course, what was it that Gary Player always said "the more I practice, the luckier I get?" And of course, hasn't many a wise man intoned, "I would rather be lucky than good?"

Notwithstanding the role that good fortune always plays in good outcomes, there is a lesson to be learned from the successful campaign. Come on admit it. When the tax proposal was unveiled November 6 how many of you thought its imposition was a forgone conclusion given the enormity of the \$42 billion shortfall and the pain of all the proposed cuts in education, mass transit, and programs for children?

Truth be known an awful lot of us in the "fight" had our doubts, often speaking privately of "soft landings" and mitigations.

The lesson?

No matter how difficult the circumstances, how daunting the odds, how overwhelming the opposition, or how meager the resources available, if the facts and the equities are with your cause, you have a chance – IF YOU HAVE THE WILL TO CARRY THE FIGHT!

At the February 23 Golf Advisory Committee, three of us who hail from SMGC, Gene Vano, Stu Olster and I joined four colleagues in sponsoring a Motion to task Advisory Committee Chair Ted Winship (Hansen Dam), with penning an entreaty to the Board of Recreation & Parks Commissioners indicating the full Committee's desire to seek massive structural reform in the way the City manages its golf courses. I won't bore you with the details of five (5) basic structures the Motion referenced. Suffice it to say that all of them are practiced and practiced successfully here in Southern California, and all of them would represent major change.

Do we expect a backlash? You bet! Challenges to the status quo always invite a bad reaction. But in the final analysis, the fate of our great municipal golf system is far more important than the avoidance of personal discomforts.

Will the challenge bear fruits? In the short run, I doubt it. Never underestimate the residual strength of the dead hand of the past. But there are more "facts and equities" with those carrying forth this fight than with those who carried forth the tax fight. If they have the will to simply hold their ground, reform will surely come. This is one status quo that cannot hold.

THE GOLF COMMUNITY'S VIGILANCE PAYS OFF--NO GOLF TAX FOR NOW

February 19 After a record 45 1/2 hour session, the longest in its 160-year history, the California State Senate joined the State Assembly and Governor in passing a Budget, an adjusted one for the remainder of the 2008-2009 fiscal year and a new one for 2009-2010. In the process, the State Legislature closed a gaping \$42 billion shortfall.

The proposed golf use tax was <u>NOT</u> part of the package. Neither was the proposed 12 cents per gallon gas tax.

The remainder of the details were as follows:

TAX HIKES

- Vehicle license fee nearly doubles to 1.15%
- Sales tax rises 1%
- Income tax rises 0.25%
- Dependent tax credit is reduced by \$210

SPENDING CUTS

- \$8 billion from public schools and community colleges
- \$567 million from grants to disabled and blind
- \$1.4 billion from state worker salaries and overtime
- \$787 million from state colleges and universities
- \$460 million from public transit
- \$185 million from programs for the developmentally disabled

TAX BREAKS

- \$690 million for multistate/multinational companies
- \$200 million for small businesses hiring persons
- \$100 million for Hollywood production companies
- \$100 million in credits for persons buying new homes

VOTER APPROVAL NEEDED

- Taking \$226 million intended for mental health programs
- Taking \$608 million from programs aimed at children 5 and under
- Cap to restrict future state spending
- Borrowing \$5 billion from future lottery proceeds
- Making technical changes to educational funding formulas

The golf and other targeted "use" taxes were left out of the package for a variety of reasons, but chief among them was the Legislative Analyst Office's (LAO) Report that Michigan, Massachusetts, and Florida had recently adopted such "use" taxes only to have to repeal them shortly thereafter. This "Report" underscored the golf community's chief objections to the imposition of the tax -- that it was capricious, i.e., applied in a discriminatory and unfair manner, that it was ill crafted, that it would cause disproportionate harm to one recreational activity to the benefit of similarly situated ones, and that it contained a whole host of undesirable and unintended

consequences, chief among them the demonstrable fact that local municipal golf programs like the City and County of Los Angeles would suffer 7-figure annual "hits" to their parks budgets.

Golfers can catch their breath. But that's about all. The State's fiscal ship is no longer sinking, but it is by no means completely through the present storm. Neither is the national economy. The issue will no doubt be revisited, probably sooner than later.

A Legislative Tax Reform Commission is expected to make a report in April. It is highly likely that use/service taxes will be part of that discussion, although in a comprehensive as opposed to a targeted fashion as was the Governor's November golf use tax proposal.

There is no guarantee that all or even any of the "Voter Approval Needed" items above will be passed by the voters the following two months, nor is there any guarantee that tax receipts won't decline even faster than already anticipated.

Of course, as a result of the efforts of the California Alliance for Golf (CAG), the state's golf organizations, and most particularly, the thousands of golfers who contacted their legislators and signed up through www.forecalifornia.com, round two of the battle should be a little bit easier. At least, the golf community will be organized and ready. But only IF golfers keep up their guards and remain committed to public engagement.

Besides, the coming "water wars" (rationing) could make the tax fight seem tame by comparison.

2009 CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP

Our annual Club Championship is one of the premier public golf championships in the San Fernando Valley. This year's opening round will be on Balboa on Saturday, June 20. The second round will be played on Encino, Sunday, June 21. Golfers who make the cut (low 50%) will enter the third phase on June 29 at Encino.

Course Manager, Sandy Margolis, along with the Encino and Balboa Superintendents, promise the courses with be set up for tournament conditions.

The tournament committee will mark the courses, select pin locations and produce hole location sheets for all three rounds. The committee will also provide players with detailed local rules and information sheets for each round.

The tournament features four flights:

Championship (Gross), A, B and C (Net). As always, we will use a 12-month Low Index for handicapping. Blue tees are for 18 and under handicappers; the Whites are for 19 and above players. Pairings for the first 36 holes by 12-month Low Index. Players who play early the first day, will tee off later on the second. Pairings for the final round will be by order of position with flights. Any ties will be resolved by sudden death playoffs.

To enter, you must have been an SMGC member for at least 4 months, posted 8 scores in the previous 6 months, and participated in 4 or more Club competitions during the previous 12 months (not including the 2008 Championship).

There is also an optional separate championship for members of Sepulveda Eagles (SCGA affiliate club) at a cost of \$25 with participants eligible for both Championships, both prize funds, and both PLGA's Tournament of Champions later in the year.

The lowest Gross Score in the Championship flight will be SMGC's Club Champion, and will receive a trophy. Lowest Net Score overall among the three other flights will be SMGC's Net Champion and will also receive a trophy. Lowest Net Score among two remaining Net flights will be SMGC's Division Champions, and will also receive trophies. All winners will be eligible to compete in PLGA's Tournament of Champions.

Merchandise Certificates will be awarded to top finishes in all flights. Check next month's Eagle for more information.

PLAYING BY THE RULES

When a ball hangs on the lip of the cup, players may not jump up and down or stomp on the ground in an effort to jar the ball into the hole. Players who do this will receive a one-stroke penalty and be required to place the ball back in its original position.

TEE/CUP Chips

Can you handle the shock when something pops up that has the ability to knock you for a loop? If your answer is a resounding YES, read on...this one's for you!

Your first step is to lug your golf bag into the kitchen. Next, remove all clubs, standing them on end, leaning against the sink. More on this later.

Now comes the potential for some shockeroos. This step involves the unzipping of each and every pocket of your golf bag. Remove all items. ALL items. Just place them on the kitchen floor. When you've emptied the pockets, categorize the items you've unloaded.

Golf balls in one area, used Kleenex in another, old score cards in yet another. By now, you're catching on and saying to yourself, "Why is this thing in my bag?" or "That isn't my head cover...whose is it?" or "So that's where my pencil sharpener disappeared to!"

Once you've gotten over the shock of how much junk you've been carrying around all these months (years?), it's time to dump all unwanted or unneeded items. Just toss 'em. Then replace the items you still want and need into their proper pockets in your bag.

Now for the clubs. So long as they're so close to the kitchen sink, grab an old toothbrush, turn on some warm water...and scrub every groove in your set. More shockeroo. BACKSPIN SHOTS

Suppose you were a trucker with a shiny new 18-wheeler. Your new vehicle would be good and reliable, but if you ignored maintenance and necessary repairs for a period of time, your machine would become dilapidated and subject to frequent breakdowns.

What would happen if you raised your rates for shipping on your dilapidated truck? It wouldn't be long before your customers would find another company to haul its goods with better reliability and at lower prices. Who wants to pay more and get less?

What if your house deteriorated because you failed to maintain it and you put it on the market at a price higher than comparable homes for sale in your neighborhood that had been carefully maintained? Who in their right mind would pay your asking price when better homes are available for less?

Could a dairy farmer stay in business if he stopped feeding his cows? What about an airline that forgets to maintain its fleet?

Golf rates were raised here in our fair City in 2008 somewhere between a little and a lot depending on whether you're lucky enough to be an LA City resident or not. What prompted this was a shortage of money in City coffers and the Mayor's demand that revenue-producing activities (like golf) generate more dollars toward closing the budget gap. But the increased golf fees were not accompanied by provision for current or future repairs, maintenance or capital improvements. As a consequence, our golf community is asked to pay more and get less than with competing local golf opportunities.

Rec and Parks management would point out that the new fee structure has generated some increased revenue. But this marginal increase has come at the expense of a significantly reduced number of rounds. Some of these lost rounds are no doubt due to the effects of the economic recession, but it's likely that some of these are being played at well-maintained County and daily fee courses, where bargain prices are available.

Everybody associated with our LA golf system knows that infrastructure such as irrigation systems and clubhouses have reached, or are nearing, the end of their useful lives and that adequate funds have not been set aside to update or replace them. Our golf system, like the neglected big rig or home, is becoming uncompetitive and the situation is only likely to get worse before it gets better.

It occurs to The Gapwedge that decisions affecting golf by the Mayor's office and others outside the golf fraternity are going unchallenged by those who are responsible for running our courses. Inevitably not far down the road, the cash cow that is our golf system will stop giving dollars.

READY GOLF TIP

THREE THINGS THAT CAN CAUSE A SLICE

A slice can frustrate golfers tremendously. In general, a slice can be be broken down into three main causes.

First, insufficient shoulder rotation. Not only can the lack of shoulder turn cause the slice, but the overcompensation made by the "arms only" backswing can be another culprit.

Second, a slice can result when the lower body leans too much towards the target. This leads to unstable body movement and weight shift during the downswing. You should try to imagine that the left side of your body is up against a wall at set up...and through your swing.

The third cause can be due to the left wrist still facing the target after impact. This is because the left wrist did not rotate or roll all the way through. This non-action will prevent the clubhead from releasing past our hands at impact. Most golfers suffer from this third reason.

A lot of these slice tendencies occur when you're trying to swing too fast. A simple remedy can be, the next time you hit a slice, try to relax your body and swing with about half the power.

USGA RULE OF THE DAY

25-1b/17 Pine Needles Piled for Removal Interfere with Line of Play After Ball Dropped Away

Q: A player whose ball lies in pine needles piled for removal drops away under Rule 25-1b. The ball comes to rest in such a position that the pile of pine needles intervenes on his line of play. May the player remove the pine needles from his line of play?

A: Yes. Pine needles piled for removal are loose impediments or ground under repair. Initially, the player was entitled to remove the pine needles under Rule 23-1 (Loose Impediments) or drop away, as he did, under Rule 25-1b. After the player dropped away a new situation existed and he was no longer entitled to invoke Rule 25-1b. However, he was not prohibited from removing the pine needles under Rule 23-1.
